Intermediaries: A Voice for the Voiceless

Purpose

To allow children and vulnerable people to understand, and to be understood, in the legal system

Legislation

Section 29, Youth Justice and Criminal Evidence Act, 1999

'Their [Intermediaries'] primary function is to improve the quality of evidence and aid understanding between the court, the advocates and the witness or defendant.' (Criminal Practice Direction, 3F.1)

Intermediaries

Status

- Independent & impartial
- Assist prosecution/ defence/ judge by supporting communication between these parties and vulnerable person

Backgrounds include:

- Speech and language therapists
- Psychological and mental health professionals
- Teachers
- Social workers

...& undergo further training

Work with


Witnesses (Statutory)

- All those under 18
- Adult witnesses with assessed disability impacting on communication &/ or comprehension skills

Vulnerable defendants
Suspects
Respondents
(Discretionary)

including family proceedings & tribunals

NB legislation, funding & access differ from witness provision



For witnesses

- Registered Intermediary sourced from Witness Intermediary Scheme, run by NCA
- Call Witness Team for advice 0345 000 5463

Process

- IO gets permission from DI/ DS
- Complete RFS form from NCA
- Return with cost code/purchase order

Accessing an Intermediary

For suspects

 Sourced by police or solicitor (see 'Sourcing Intermediaries' box)

Process

 Police seek permission from DI/ DS; police pay

For family courts

 Sourced mainly by solicitor who then makes an application in court (see 'Sourcing Intermediaries' box)

Process

 Court Order confirms that HMCTS will pay (where no other source of funding is available)

For defendants/respondents

- Sourced by solicitor who then applies to court for special measures (see 'Sourcing Intermediaries' box) or
- Appointed at discretion of judge/ magistrate

Process

 Solicitor seeks permission/ funding from Legal Aid Authority (LAA)
